Letter from the CEO

DEAR DOWNTOWN RICHMOND PARTNER,

While unique challenges have marked the last few years for Downtowns and urban areas across the country and the world, our Downtown continues to fare better than most and shows impressive signs of recovery and even growth.

If there's any question about Downtown's continuing upward trajectory, we need only look at the hundreds of millions of dollars in investments toward transformational new developments.

The Shockoe Project promises a multi-faceted development in Shockoe Valley that will span both sides of Broad Street and comprise the National Slavery Museum, African Burial Ground, Lumpkins Slave Jail and the Mary Lumpkin Event Lawn, Slave Auction Sites, Winfree Cottage, and the Trail of the Enslaved. The Shockoe Institute will act as the gateway to the project and be housed on the lower level of Main Street Station.

City Center is a multi-use development that will replace the outdated Coliseum and showcase a new world-class convention headquarters hotel, offices, residences, retail, and open green space in the heart of the city. It will expand the potential for larger and more frequent conventions hosted at the Greater Richmond Convention Center, bringing that significant regional facility closer to its optimum use and attracting more visitors to our Downtown core.

City Center and The Shockoe Project are unparalleled opportunities to reimagine two crucial areas of our Downtown. While both are in the planning stages, meaningful progress and funding have been achieved.

Notable projects beyond the planning stages are also in the works. Construction has begun on the new **Riverfront Amphitheater**, a 7,500-person facility with spectacular views of the James River and the



Richmond skyline. About 30 major performing artists are expected to perform there each year, with an opening in Spring 2026.

Virginia Public Media is planning a groundbreaking for its new headquarters, which will move from Chesterfield County to Historic Monroe Ward on Broad Street. The 5-story, 53,000-square-foot state-of-the-art media facility will open in the Arts District in 2026 and will further enliven the neighborhood with a vibrant public space open and accessible to all.

Finally, Virginia Commonwealth

University soon breaks ground on the new 200,000-square-foot **CoStar Center for Arts and Innovation**. This unique space at the corner of Belvidere and Broad Streets will offer a dramatic gateway to the Arts District while combining VCU's arts and innovation programs and creating exciting new collaborative opportunities for faculty and students in the fields of Cinema, Communication Arts, Dance, Music, Theatre, and those that are part of



DOWNTOWN PLACEMAKING

Whether it's wayfinding or beautification, Venture Richmond has a hand in placemaking efforts to improve the quality of life in Downtown's Service Districts.

Canal Walk and Riverfront Placemaking

- 60 existing banners on the Canal Walk/Brown's Island replaced with new banners and 45 new banners and brackets added to the Canal Walk/Brown's Island

Venture Richmond provides enhanced property management services for business improvement districts comprising Downtown, the northern Riverfront and Manchester.

Graffiti Removal in the Broad Street Corridor


